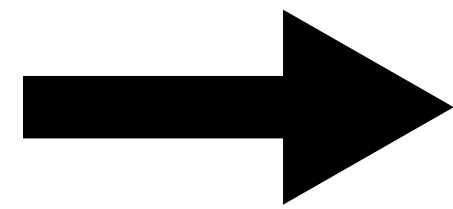

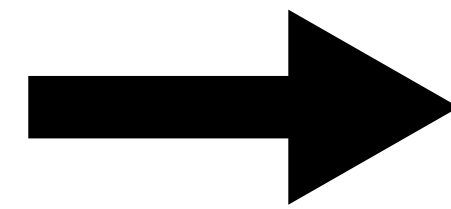
How to Open the Photo Editor

Core Adjustments - Most Used

1. Auto-Enhance

- The “Magic Wand”

2. Exposure & Brilliance

- Exposure - is overall “Brightness”
- Brilliance - balances highlights and shadows

3. Contrast & Brightness

- Contrast - add punch or softness
- Brightness - mid-tone adjustments

4. Saturation & Vibrance

- Saturation - overall color intensity
- Vibrance - boosts muted colors without affecting skin tones

5. Sharpness -

- Enhance Detail
- Don't overdo it, creates grain

All Adjustments are Non-Destructive!

Filters and Crop/Rotate tools

1. There Are 9 Filters to select from

- Vivid / Vivid Warm / Vivid Cool
 - These will boost color and contrast
- Dramatic / Dramatic Warm / Dramatic Cool
 - Will produce deeper shadows and moodier tones
- Mono / Silvertone / Noir
 - Black and White styles with different contrast levels
- You can adjust the Strength of the filter from 100% back down to 0%
- You can still make other adjustments once the filter is applied
- All changes are non-destructive, you can Revert back to the Original Photo

2. Crop/Rotate Tool Highlights

- Straighten the horizon quickly
- Crop to remove distractions in your photo
- Preset frame sizes from 4x3 to 19x9 for local media and printing
- Other - Flip / Horizontal & Vertical

Why the Clean Up Tool Might Not Be on Your iPhone

1. The feature may not be released yet for your device or iOS version

Several users have reported that Apple announced the Clean Up tool as part of an upcoming **Apple Intelligence** update, but it **had not yet been released** at the time they expected it to appear.
